Dear Mr. President:

As you prepare your Fiscal Year 2020 budget, we ask you to include full funding of \$200M to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for its vital mission to restore America's Everglades – the largest ecosystem restoration project in the world.

**Every dollar invested in Everglades restoration returns at least four dollars to the economy**<sup>1</sup>. At the same time, constructing these projects creates thousands of jobs while protecting a unique ecosystem that provides drinking water to 8 million people in Florida.

The plan for restoring America's Everglades involves projects included in the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP) and non-CERP projects. Implementation of these projects involves an equal partnership between the State of Florida and the Federal Government. In recent years, the State has prioritized Everglades projects with appropriations that surpass the \$200M per year standard envisioned when Congress authorized CERP in 2000. At the same time, Federal appropriations contributed to the project have fallen well below this standard.

These projects, when implemented, will move badly needed fresh water to Everglades National Park and the Florida Keys. Some of these projects will help to alleviate the periodic devastating polluted discharges from Lake Okeechobee into the fragile St. Lucie and Caloosahatchee River estuaries that are currently plaguing coastal communities.

The U.S. Department of the Interior also plays an important role in efforts to restore the Everglades. Therefore, we ask that Interior funding for Everglades restoration be increased to address the problem of invasive exotic plants at the Arthur R. Marshall Loxahatchee National Wildlife Refuge, among other critical needs. The State of Florida has recently agreed to contribute additional funding to stymie the
